If you have not completed the <u>Action Alert</u> take one minute to make sure that Governor Walz & legislators know that you support school counseling & safe schools for non-public students which will make a positive difference in the lives of our students.

Guidance for the second round of Emergency Assistance for Nonpublic School (EANS II) has not been published by the US Department of Education. These funds would likely be available late summer/early fall.

Esports is exploding around the world, with an estimated viewership of over 400 million people in 2021. American high schools and universities are riding this wave, using esports to add the element of high-stakes teamwork often provided by traditional sports to the problem-solving elements necessary for success in STEM fields. Admissions Professional Development Webinar The Ride to Independent Schools June 17, 2021 12:00 PM - 1:15 PM

The process for families of choosing an independent school is a journey. It involves much consideration, a great deal of investigation and ultimately critical decision-making. This session will share insights from The Enrollment Management Association's special report The Ride to Independent Schools 2020-2021 featuring insights, data, and recommendations based on a survey of nearly 3,000 families during the summer of 2020. The more that schools can appreciate and understand what parents are thinking and how they are feeling at each stage of that ride, the better they will be at meeting parents' needs and concerns. Empowered by the insights of parents, schools can create a process that is meaningful and satisfying, which in turn will help with schools' enrollment.

MDE Federal/Title Programs Update

Unspent Title I, Title II, Title III, and/or Title IVA funds are carried into the school next year when a Local Educational Agency (LEA) does not spend the full



nonpublic equitable share in a given year. These unspent funds will remain reserved for services to the original nonpublic school to use until they expire (after 27 months) or unless the nonpublic school declines the use of the funds. LEAs are encouraged to consult with nonpublic school officials to create a plan for using funds in a timely way. If a nonpublic school is not on track to use the services funded by the equitable share, then the LEA may request the nonpublic school consider releasing funds to be used for services at other nonpublic schools within the LEA boundaries.

Nonpublic school officials are strongly encouraged to consider their needs and, if they will not use all of the services, release funds to be used elsewhere in order to avoid having funds returned to the federal government.
