## Advocacy 101

MISF School Leadership Conference September 28, 2021





### **Background Information**

- The regular legislative session begins on the first Tuesday of January in odd-numbered years. The legislative session is a two-year session. For 2021-22, it is the 92nd Legislative Session.
- The first year of the two-year session must adjourn no later than the third Monday in May in the odd numbered year. The second year must adjourn sine die no later than the even-numbered year.
- The Governor (and only the Governor) may call the legislature into Special Session.
- The House elects 134 members and the Senate elects 67 members.
- House members serve a two-year term, the Senate serves a four-year term except the two years before redistricting. For example, Senators elected in 2020 will serve a two-year term and are up for election with the House in 2022.
- The Courts are expected to release the new legislative districts in late February 2022.





### **Background Information**

- At the start of the two-year legislative session, the House and Senate elect legislators to serve in leadership.
- The full House elects the Speaker of the House and the two major party caucuses –
   Republicans and Democrats elects the majority/minority leaders.
- The full Senate will elect the President of the Senate and the two major party caucuses will elect majority/minority leaders.
  - Representative Melissa Hortman (DFL-Brooklyn Park) is the Speaker of the House
  - Representative Ryan Winkler (DFL-Golden Valley) is the House Majority Leader
  - Representative Kurt Daudt (R-Crown) is the House Minority Leader
  - Senator Jeremy Miller (R-Winona) is the President of the Senate and was recently elected the Senate Majority Leader (Senator Paul Gazelka stepped down)
  - Senator Melisa Lopez Franzen (R-Edina) is the Senate Minority Leader



### **Background Information**

- The leaders of the majority party in the House and Senate set the committee structure and name the chairs and members of the committee.
- The legislative work is done in committees not on the floors of the House and Senate. The bills are largely intact for votes once they reach the floors of each body. Amendments may be considered on the floor but rarely adopted.

## Engagement with Legislators

Minnesota has a "Citizen Legislature" meaning the legislature is <u>not</u> a full-time, professional legislature. Minnesota has one of the largest legislatures in the country with 134 Representatives and 67 Senators.

Contact with local constituents is welcome and expected.

Building a solid working relationship with local legislators is important in gaining trust and support for non-public schools.



## Key Dates for Engagement

#### Odd-numbered years:

- First Tuesday in January: Start of the two-year session
- Late February/Early March: State budget forecast is released by Minnesota Management & Budget (MMB) – legislature knows how much funding is available for General Fund appropriations for the two-year biennial budget.
- March/April: Legislative committees assemble and pass omnibus budget bills.
- Third Monday in May: Legislature must adjourn regular session.

  Legislature will set the date for the even-numbered session.
- July 1: First day of the new state fiscal year.
- Late November/Early December: MMB released updated state budget forecast.

#### **Even-numbered years:**

**Legislature sets the date:** In 2022, it is January 31.

**Late February/Early March**: MMB releases updated state budget forecast.

March/April: Legislature considers supplemental and capital budget bills

Third Monday in May: Legislature must adjourn sine die.



## Engagement with Legislators

#### There's various ways to engage with legislators including:

- In-person meetings in legislative district (with possible school tour)
- In-person meeting at State Capitol
- Virtual/Zoom meeting
- Emails with legislators
- Phone calls and messages
- Social Media Facebook, Twitter, Instagram



## In-Person Meetings with Legislators

In-person meetings with legislators may be requested in district or at the State Capitol. During the legislative session, it is best to request the meeting at the State Capitol unless it is a Friday or weekend.


- Request meeting in writing, typically by drafting an email to the legislator.
- If no response, follow-up in 3 to 4 business days.
- Finalize meeting with legislator. If possible, schedule a school tour.



# Example of Invite to Legislator to Meet

Your email message should include the following:

- 1. Greeting
- 2. Who are you and contact info
- 3. Request meeting
- 4. Background information
- 5. Thank you/closing





### **School Tours**

- Plan the school tour route ahead of time.
- Invite local board members, parents or community members.
- Arrange for local legislator to visit a classroom for a short period of time.
- Circle back to an office or conference room to further discuss issues and make direct ask.
   Leave behind information about the school and the legislative request.
- Take photos of legislator and school personnel when they are visiting school.
- Post photos on social media thanking the legislator for visiting school.
- Send photo to local media and legislator.
- The tour and meeting should last no more than one hour.



### **School Tours**

If there's no photo, it did not happen! Here's Senator Jeremy Miller stopping by for a tour and meeting with Hope Lutheran High School in 2019.







## Direct Advocacy Emails to Legislators

When setting up a meeting or tour isn't possible, send a direct email to legislators requesting a response.

- Option 1: Draft your own email message making sure you hit on key points and request a response.
- Option 2: Use the OAK advocacy network to submit email there will be copy text to use that may be modified – see opportunityforallkids.org



#### Phone Calls

You may reach legislators at their office in St. Paul. It's best to first reach out to their Legislative Assistant. Request to speak to the legislator, give the reason for the call, and leave your personal contact information.






### Social Media


## Legislators are on social media – Facebook, Twitter and sometimes Instagram

- Follow legislators on their social media accounts.
- Ask legislators to follow your non-public school (if you have social media accounts).
- If a legislator visits the school or staff/students, post pictures on the nonpublic school's social media account(s) and send photos to legislator to post on their social media accounts.

## Last Thoughts...

- Don't be nervous or worried about meeting with legislators they expect constituents to reach out.
- Keep the meeting on time and on schedule have an agenda.
- Be authentic and show legislators non-public schools are an important community asset.
- Be specific on your ask and leave behind materials for legislators.
- Take pictures!
- Follow-up with a thank you note or email to the legislator.
- Stay connected with legislator. Find ways to communicate and reach out even if you're not making a legislative request.
